LIVING ON THE EDGE

St. John's may be at the far east of Canada, but it's a hub of great music and shopping, and even better food

DAY 1

Check in at the stylish Alt Hotel St. John's (6) overlooking the busy harbour. Head to Fixed Coffee & Baking for partridgeberry squares and something caffeinated before an Iceberg Quest boat trip (11) to look for icebergs, humpback whales, puffins and seabirds. If you return hungry,

fine-dining institution Raymonds has tasting menus showcasing locally foraged and sourced ingredients, but head chef Jeremy Charles also helms buzzy Merchant Tavern, where vinegar pie with Tetley tea ice cream is a must. Do a music crawl along pub-packed George Street, taking a small detour to Water Street and the intimate Black Sheep, which features live bands daily.

DAY 2

Start the day in Quidi Vidi (1), a historic fishing neighbourhood, for brunch at Mallard Cottage (5), where the cod cakes are divine and the cake table is delicious temptation. Wander over to Quidi Vidi Brewing Co. for their Iceberg Beer and to Quidi Vidi Village Plantation (7) to see artisans at work in tiny studios that double as shops.

Climb up to Signal Hill **National Historic Site for** a little military history, then hike the North Head Trail down rocky terrain back to the hotel. Linger over dinner at Chinched (4), especially local mussels or charcuterie and the signature pig-ear "fries" tossed in buffalo sauce.








DAY 3

Wake up before dawn to watch the sunrise from Cape Spear Lighthouse at the eastern edge of Canada, then explore The Rooms (3). It's the province's largest public cultural space-and also has a wonderful café. Then find Jellybean Row (8), which is slang for any cluster of colourful houses. The nickname stems from an iconic tourism campaign that used three Kimberly Row houses, but homes along Prescott and Gower streets are now the most photographed.

Next, browse the Craft **Council of Newfoundland** & Labrador (2), a gallery and shop featuring work from artists across the province, plus bakeapple jam from Dark Tickle Co. (9). Or shop Posie Row & Co., a collective of local businesses housed in one four-storey building. If it seems strange to have a final East Coast meal at a tapas bar, order the croquetas de bacalao and brandada de bacalao made from local salt cod at Boca (10), and it will all make sense.
